









## Residential Buildings w/ 9+ units for last 12 months









# **Permit Annual Inspections by Section (High-Rise)**







#### **Activities and Projects:**

- I am continuing to support B4 to complete open task-book for Station 16 members for Large Vessel Boat Operations. We have been fully operational daily with the completion of task books and engagement from the personnel at Station 16.
- The 136th academy is doing very well. They are in week 18 and winding down for graduation. Manipulative testing is completed, and we currently have 40 members.

- Special Ops is conducting several drills throughout the city. They completed tower rescues on Sutro Tower. Also Shoring drills and extrication drills with several companies. They also completed a successful multi-agency Haz Mat drill with the 95th Civil Support Group and the FBI.
- The DOT is moving forward with developing a Rope Rescue Awareness and Operations Cadre. We hosted a class on 11/5 with CJAC funds. This class task-booked two of our internal instructors so we can continue this class internally free to our members. This class is the gateway to several other certifications that staff our specialty units. We hope to have a large cadre very soon and hope to give this course as an academy curriculum in future classes.
- H16 Neal Narayan is hard at work making training videos and organizing our Vector Solutions program. We completed the Leadership podcast and are recording a Career Track and Cancer Prevention podcast the first week of December. The goal is to have 1 per month on various subjects.
- H16 Neal Narayan has been getting familiar with our new drone that was purchased with CJAC funds. It will be used as an essential training tool to film evolutions and future incidents for training opportunities.
- The last two months the DOT hosted ICS 300, Fire Prevention Classes, Public Safety diver, and a Truck Academy organized by our internal Cadre. We have upcoming classes: Fire investigation classes, an entry class to limit property damage, and TIC Operations classes. These are mostly funded with CJAC funds and the volunteer attendance by our members is overwhelming.
- In-Service staff are currently taking training to the field and visiting stations to conduct training. This will continue to happen between large modules and will utilize fire houses and other locations in the city.
- In Service Training has had multiple live burns. The props have been re-imagined making it more realistic with bedrooms, kitchen, closets, furniture, cabinets, and hoarder conditions. Wet hay has been used to produce smokey conditions, but the fire is kept small for safety. We are very aware of using organic materials for our members' safety. This, along with safety lines, escape doors and training staff monitoring with TIC's, make a very realistic and safe training evolution.
- In Service Training is wrapping up another hose tender module to ensure all our members are up to speed with our new apparatus.
- The H3 Academy is winding down and doing very well. We are in week 11 for the L1 and week 7 for L2 with a graduation of 12/12/25.
- The DOT is working on a Virtual Command and Control exercise for our chief officers which will consist of radio traffic, a fire scenario, and assigning companies. Additionally, it will have a Tablet Command component for tracking companies. BC Cannon is assisting with IPAD and Tablet Command.
- Completion of registration with the Federal Excess Program is complete. This program will allow us to obtain training materials, industrial vehicles such as forklifts, and other resources free of charge.
- I am working with the Training Committee on a Training Bulletin to update our suggested pump pressure as the efficiency of pumps and hoses has increased since our standards were written. Several tests with flow meters have been conducted to obtain this information.
- In Service Training installed a simulated power line prop at DOT Folsom for alternate ladder raises.

• The DOT and the field have increased their support for the Fire Reserves. We are detailing companies to assist them on Thursday Training nights. Several officers have volunteered to assist with this. We have obtained equipment for them and are searching for a dedicated legacy apparatus to give to them for training and company pride. Rescue 2 will be doing extrication drills with them on 12/11 in which we obtained 2 wrecked vehicles to use.





#### **Special Operations Training, Tyson Yee, Captain**

October/November 2025 Monthly Report

Special Operations continue to train as we roll towards the holiday season. We are working with our outside agencies (UCSF, Sutro Tower, 95th Civil Support Team, Chase Center, SFPD, FBI, and Golden Gate Bridge Authority) and plan for more complex and collaborative exercises in the months to come. There have been disappointments too. With the federal government shutdown, all our planning to host the Navy service men and women during FLEET WEEK at Treasure Island Training Facility was cancelled.

Instead of shutting down, we focused our efforts on our own members. Special Operations has completed the new rope rescue equipment training with both rescue squads. The CMC Clutch is now part of the standard operating procedures. I have started the same process of integrating new equipment with both Station 14 and 19 with their respective Cliff Rescue units. It is my hope to complete this by end of year.

In the field of Auto Extrication 101 for truck companies, A/Lt. David Halpin has been training his cadre to be able to teach a standardized method for auto emergencies that is based on our newest training manual. We are moving to a new model where once a week a different truck company will be detailed to DOT to complete this training. This also leaves at least one car out of our 5 monthly allotments for the rescue squad to do a more "advanced drill i.e. car on its side, upside down, etc" so that they can increase their proficiency.

The Public Safety Dive training class concluded in October with 12 new divers ready to answer the call. The new divers spent over 40 hours in the classroom, the pool, the reservoir, and the bay honing their search skills and dive patterns. FF Towner, FF Mason, and FF Waterman are our newest SFFD dive masters to certify and be able to conduct in house training of our members. This was their first class since getting the certification.

Helicopter Rescue Program continues to cross train H3 paramedics for both air and water operations. FF/PM Canning has done an excellent job preparing our HRTs for the difficult scenarios that they may face. Special Operations is also conducting HRT Orientations and Operations training with our cliff units for better inter-agency communications and safety.

I would say a highlight of these 2 months was a high angle exercise with our rescue squads over 600' above the city at Sutro Tower on November 1st. FF Jason Harrell (960 program) had nurtured a relationship with Sutro Tower such that it is our hope to do bi-annual collaborative training at the site. Even the pictures I have submitted for this monthly report does not do the justice of actually being above the clouds and hanging off a rope for a rescue. The feeling and sensation is insanely amazing and humbling at the same time.

Lower in height but just as important on the rope rescue spectrum, FF/PM Canning and Captain Yee (myself) led another Rope Rescue Awareness Operations class to certify another 12 members for California State Fire Marshal class. We both completed our skills task books and are ready to offer this training to the rest of our department in 2026. We are planning for 4 classes per year going forward as we build our training cadre.

The SFFD hosted a Structural Collapse Specialist level 2 Class where NCRT trained 15 of our members in the art of breaching, lifting, and supporting large concrete structures and compromised buildings. SFFD members from both RS1 and RS2 got a chance to work together all week long solving rescue scenarios. I hope to design drills in the future that also emphasizes this invaluable team building experience.

On November 18th, Special Operations was able to plan and coordinate a Hazmat drill with the 95th Civil support team and the FBI at our own Treasure Island Training Facility. B02 and E36 with our SFFD Hazmat team worked on all day scenarios regarding JHAT detection, testing and mitigation. FF/PM Steve Marcotte has been an instrumental part of our Hazmat planning. As the large bay area events such as Superbowl and FIFA Soccer approach, it was a great opportunity for all the Bay Area Hazmat responders to do a test run and learn from each other.

On the fire side, Special Operations facilitated 50' ladder drills at Station 12, audited the Truck Academy skill stations, facilitated LRV orientation and shoring drills with Station 5, participated in a UCSF evacuation drill, and conducted a B06 below grade search and rescue with multiple victims. Next month, Special Operations plans to keep maintaining and working with all our partners who want to conduct valuable training for our members. We will also be introducing and using new equipment called the AquaEye to our Rescue Squads. This promising new technology will hopefully make underwater dive search and recovery faster and safer for our divers. Testing and drills will take place in the 2nd and 3rd weeks of December.







# In-Service Training, James Draper, In Service Training Captain

October/November 2025 Monthly Report

Continued with live burn at TITF. Rescues, RIC, and Decontamination elements have been added to the evolutions. "Storm stick" training has been widely accepted in the department and is being used in the field. Remote field training continues concentrating on "basics" Ladders and hose leads per fire department training manuals. Truck academy support took place in October. TITF staff checked out multiple sites on Treasure Island to be used as training; however, the final decision was made to build props to order and hold the entire island part of the academy inside the TITF. Hose tender module started up again in November, concentrating on Battalions 7, 8, and 10 where the hose tenders will be housed.

## **Meetings and Planning**

- Continued coordination with firehouse instructors and training teams to deliver daily drills and operations.
- Equipment and prop maintenance including ongoing work on fire simulation burn boxes and vehicle fire props.
- Planning sessions with training leadership to optimize upcoming training academies and specialized training modules for the crew.
- Emphasis on hose tender operations focusing on placement, deployment, and tactical use in varied fire-ground scenarios.
- Live burn exercises continued regularly to maintain proficiency in interior attack and fire behavior understanding.
- Inservice team focused on field training activities, ensuring firefighters meet operational standards and safety protocols.
- Haz-Mat training with the 95th CST and FBI. Structural collapse class, and Rope Rescue Awareness classes.



























## Auto Extrication Drills, Alan Camarillo, Training Lieutenant
