### **OPERATIONS REPORT**

June 1, 2017 – June 30, 2017

### **GREATER ALARMS:**

There was 1 greater alarm fire during this reporting period at the following location:

4th Alarm – (6/16/17) 1306 hours, 1300 Donner Avenue came in for a reported warehouse building on fire. Units arrived on scene to a one story, type 2 building. Staging occurred at Ingalls Street/Carroll Avenue. Assistant Chief William Storti was the Chief in Command. This fire was contained to the building of origin (1300 Donner). It resulted in a "shelter-in-place" order being given for the surrounding area. A challenge at this fire was arcing electrical wires. No injuries were reported as a result of this fire. The fire was determined to be accidental, caused by overloaded electrical.

### **Notable Incidents**

- -• 06-02-2017 was the 6<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Berkeley Way fire. RIP Lt. Vincent Perez and FF/PM Anthony Valerio.
- —• 06-03-2017 CLIFF RESCUE at 2200 hrs. At Mile Rock. 1 Adult was rescued with no injuries.
- 06-04-2017 at 5:40 pm a BAY RESCUE was executed for a kite surfer in distress near the warming hut off Crissy Field. The adult was rescued with minor injuries.
- 06-06-2017 at 12:22 pm, a VEHICLE COLLISION ROLLOVER resulted in three entrapments at MLK at Kezar. All parties were extricated with minor injuries.
- 06-10-2017 CLIFF RESCUE Fort Funston at 1600hrs. 1 canine was rescued, no injuries.
- 06-10-2017 CLIFF RESCUE Fort Funston at 1719hrs. 1 adult and 1 canine were rescued with no injuries.
- At approximately 11:50pm on Thursday, June 8<sup>th</sup>, a WORKING FIRE broke out at 775 Post Street #205. The fire was contained at approximately 12:43am. 4 adults and 2 cats were displaced by this fire and received American Red Cross (ARC) assistance as well as City Services notification (HSA).
  - At approximately 3:23pm on June 11<sup>th</sup>, a WORKING FIRE was reported at 112 Ironwood Street. At approximately 3:45pm the fire was contained. 5 adults and 1 child were displaced and received aid from ARC as well as HSA.
  - At approximately 11:23am on June the 13<sup>th</sup>, crews responded to a WORKING FIRE at 244 Miranda Ave. The fire was contained at 11:54am 3 Adults were displaced, all of which declined ARC/HSA services.
- On June 14<sup>th</sup>, at approximately 9:00 am, call was received by 9-1-1 Emergency Dispatch Center reporting an ACTIVE SHOOTER in the UPS building at 17th and Utah Streets.

- A large number of Police and Fire and EMS Units responded. A Unified Command post was established.
- An "avoid-the-area" message was sent to the public at 9:10 a.m. The incident also prompted a "shelter-in-place" advisory for the surrounding area. Nearby schools were notified.
- Prior to 9:30 a.m. the shooter was rendered harmless. A total of 11 persons within the UPS building were injured, four of them fatally. The shooter was one of the 4 fatalities.
- On 06-16-2017 at 1309 hours, a 4-ALARM FIRE occurred at 1300 Donner.
- 06-16-2017 at 1436hrs. A CLIFF RESCUE occurred at Baker Beach and Crosby. One adult was rescued and evaluated by medics.
- 06-22-2017 CLIFF/SURF RESCUE at 1842hrs. Near the Legion of Honor, A technical land and water rescue took place for a 17yo female who fell off the cliffs, resulting in fatal injuries.
- • 06-24-2017 a WORKING FIRE broke out at 495 Castro at 1551 hrs. No injuries or displacements were reported. The fire was in the direct path of the 2017 Dyke March that was scheduled to begin at 1700 Hrs. Thanks to all the crews on scene, who factored in the importance of the March, for being able to clear the roadways prior to the event taking place.
- 06-24/25-2017 a WORKING FIRE occurred at the Koret Playground, in Golden Gate Park, resulting in damage to a popular playground. The Department has been, and continues to, work with all departments affected. This fire is currently under investigation.
  - At approximately 5:30 am on June the 26th, a WORKING FIRE occurred at 2084 Mission Street resulting in three adult displacements. One occupant was able to return to his/her unit after minor water damage was mitigated. Two units are uninhabitable.
  - At approximately 8:44 pm, June 26th at 60 Spotford Street in Chinatown. PGE was called to turn off gas and discovered a secondary situation of a GAS LEAK in the area. Three adults were displaced. 2 adults received assistance from the Red Cross.
- On June 27<sup>th</sup>, at 1728hrs, an EMS RED-ALERT was established for a MUNI vs. truck collision at Castro and Beaver Streets. This resulted in a total for 10 patients. 8 adults were taken to area hospitals with minor injuries, and 2 adults declined transport.

### **Functions**

- 06-20-2017 FF/Keith Baraka and BC/Juratovac were acknowledged by the SF BOS for their efforts in promoting LGBTQ awareness within the Department.
- FS 7 Conducted a number of community events for the Latino community over the month, including community outreach, fire station tours, and prevention education materials.
- FS8 Promoted LGBTQ month with a rainbow lighted display on the front of FS 8.
- On the 24-25 of June, the 47<sup>th</sup> ANNUAL PRIDE PARADE and festival took place.

### **Drills**

- On 06-03-2017, the Department collaborated with the Bay Area Association of Disabled Sailors (BAADS) and held a series of water rescue drills allowing both entities to experience how to rescue an individual with adaptive needs. Lessons learned included the need to be vocal with those who are blind, to be tactile with those who are deaf, and how to secure and rescue someone who does not have use of their arms or legs. The Department's PIO worked with the DEM PIO and members of BAADS on learning how to put out emergency messages for these events. We are now better prepared to respond to emergencies involving persons with adaptive needs. Special thanks to BC Kircher and BC McGee for spearheading this collaborative effort.
- On 06-18-2017, the Department trained with the National Park Service, VA Hospital Helipad staff, and the California Highway Patrol Air Division on HELO-CASTING. This is training that allowed our members first-hand experience and training on how to conduct an air based water rescue. SFFD Members were picked up by the helicopter and taken to a mock rescue off china beach. Simulated water conditions prevented a traditional boat or shore rescue. Members deployed from the helicopter into the water and successfully rescued the mock victim. We are now better prepared to respond to these types of incidents, and plan on doing more collaborative training with our partners at the CHP.
- On 06-20-2017, the Department along with members from the National Park Service (NPS), United States Coast guard (USCG), National Weather Service (NWS/NOAA), Emergency Management Department (DEM), and the San Francisco Police Department Marine Unit gave a Media presentation on the following topics, which included two MOCK rescue drills:
  - o Ocean Safety
  - o Cliff Safety
  - Rock Safety
  - o RIPCURRENT awareness
  - SNEAKERWAVE awareness
  - HEAT issues and prevention tips
  - Boat Safety and tips
  - Animal safety and rules around cliffs and the Ocean
  - o Options for safer Protected beaches such as Stinson Beach

- Coastal Rescue companies continue to hand out Surf Hazard educational materials to the community while on calls, or while out in public, in collaboration with the NPS.
- Cliff Rescue units provided cliff rescue and animal safety COMMUNITY OUTREACH in areas such as Fort Funston, Ocean Beach, and Lands End.
- Public messaging on how to use a fire extinguisher was posted on social media.

- Earthquake safety tips such as DROP, COVER, HOLD ON, were promoted on social media sites this month.
- On 06-22-2017, in anticipation of increased heat and the pride festivities, the
  Department reached out to Bay area Fire and Police agencies to promote our Ocean and
  Heat safety messages. Special thanks to the Sacramento, Modesto, and Rocklin Fire
  Departments for sharing this important message.
- 06-22-2017 the BATTALION 5 SAFETY FAIR was held at FS10 from 0900-1300 hours. More than 150 people stopped by to learn how to use a fire extinguisher, Handsonly CPR, and other safety prevention tips. A special thanks to Commissioner Nakajo who joined us for this event.
- 06-30-2017 a joint PRESS CONFERENCE with SFFD, SFPD and DEM was held regarding 4<sup>th</sup> of July events, how and when to call 911, or to report fireworks, and safety precautions to be taken.
- The Department entered into an agreement with rebuilding Together SF, a non-profit organization, to supply Fire Extinguishers and Smoke Detectors to community members who take our Prevention and Education Class, or attend a Safety fair. Community members must fill out an application for this service, and must meet the financial requirements for this program. - 06-05-17 Units responded to a vehicle crash, following a CHP pursuit, at Market and Gough Streets. Two patients transported to San Francisco General Hospital. Battalion 2 and RC-3.
- 06-09-17 Units responded to Beach Chalet near Great Highway for a vehicle rollover involving an SFPD cruiser. Two officers transported to San Francisco General Hospital. Medic 94, Medic 75, RC-2, Battalion 8.
- 06-14-17 Units responded to a Mass Casualty Shooting at Utah and 17<sup>th</sup> Streets. Four patients were transported by SFFD to area hospitals. Division 3 (IC), RC-3 (MGS), Safety-1, and EMS-1.
- 06-18-17 Units responded to a shooting on the Bay Bridge. Medic 71 transported one patient to Highland Hospital. RC-1, Battalion 3.
- 06-27-17 Units responded to a truck versus MUNI bus at Beaver and Castro Streets.
   A medical Red Alert was struck on this call. Battalion 5 (IC), RC-3 (MGS), RC-2 (Transport). Ten patients in total; 2 refusals, 8 transports to Kaiser Geary (6) and to SFGH (2). None of the transports were critical, all were minor injuries.

- On June 17, 2017, a BLS Engine Company assessed and treated a patient using the new protocol and equipment
  - o Engine 23 deployed an EpiPen autoinjector on an adult Allergic Reaction patient
  - o Patient was reported as being severely Short of Breath
  - o Engine 23 was on scene three minutes (3:01) before the Medic Unit
  - o Patient was intubated nasally and condition improved during transport
  - o Compliments to the crew of Engine 23, and to RC-2
- The Epi/Narcan training was timely and valuable and is already benefiting the public (our patients)

- Continue to work with Central Shops to keep fleet in running order
  - One of our ambulances has been sent to Leader (Southern California) for inspection and repairs
- Central Shops is performing Preventative Maintenance on ambulances on a daily basis
- SFFD staff meet weekly with Central Shops personnel to ensure program compliance
